SETUP-Assisted MSMEs Undergo Regional Evaluation in Region 1

To recognize the outstanding achievements of micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs) in Region 1, the Department of Science and Technology Region 1 (DOST Region 1) conducted an on-site evaluation for the Calendar Year 2025 Search for the SETUP 4.0 Awards for MSMEs and the SETUP Praise Awards from July 7 to 10, 2025.



The regional evaluation mission, covering all four provinces of Region 1, was spearheaded by the Regional Program Management Office (RPMO) of DOST Region 1, led by Assistant Regional Director for Technical Operations Ms. Racquel M. Espiritu and Ms. Adelisa Florendo, SETUP Regional Coordinator for DOST Region 1, along with RPMO support staff.

The following SETUP-assisted firms were visited and evaluated during the on-site assessment: Bakers PH from Ilocos Norte; Malakas Farm Livelihood Development Enterprises,

Nutridense Food Manufacturing Corporation from Pangasinan and Jaypee's Bakeshop from La Union - nominated for the SETUP Praise Award; Costales Ricemill from Ilocos Sur nominated for the I-Ready Award (Most Industry 4.0 Ready); NIKS Printing Shop from Ilocos Sur, which was nominated for the ICON Award (Industry 4.0 Champion of Innovation). These enterprises showcased their technological upgrades and innovations made possible through the assistance of DOST's Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP).

The evaluation pro-

cess included site inspections, interviews with business owners and staff, and a thorough review of the enterprise's innovation practices, technology adoption, productivity gains, and alignment with Industry 4.0 standards.

To ensure transparency and objectivity in the evaluation process, a panel of external evaluators was convened to join the on-site assessments.

The panel was composed of Mr. Francis Gerald Amansec, Senior Economic Development Specialist; Dr. Arnelie G. Laquidan, Associate Professor V; Dr. Ismael



Gurtiza, member of the Regional Technical Evaluation Committee (RTEC); Atty. Romina Boado-Cabrillos, Board Secretary VI; and Ms. Annalie L. Rosales, also a member of the RTEC. Their collective expertise contributed to a fair and comprehensive evaluation of the nominated SETUP-assisted firms.

The SETUP 4.0 Awards aim to highlight MSMEs that have demonstrated

significant technological and operational improvements through DOST's Small Enterprise Technology Upgrading Program (SETUP). The SETUP Praise Awards, on the other hand, recognize firms that have shown exceptional commitment and performance in implementing their innovative strategies.

The awardees are carefully screened and

selected by the panel of evaluators, and the official representatives of Region 1 will be recognized during the upcoming CEST and SETUP Summit in August 2025. Shift in rainfall patterns call for better weather monitoring

If the relentless rains that Storm Crising generated over the weekend are an indication, we may be witnessing a shift in weather patterns that will bring more torrential downpours and widespread flooding.

Twenty or so typhoons or tropical cyclones enter the Philippine area of responsibility (PAR) every year. That's more than anywhere else in the world, according to the Philippine Atmospheric, Geophysical and Astronomical Services Administration (Pag-Asa).

About 8 or 9 typhoons cut across the country, bringing with them a lethal combination of driving rain and fierce winds. Typhoons have long been blamed for the floods Filipinos have to endure every year. But a joint study by the Ateneo de Manila University, Pag-Asa and Japanese partner institutions showed that heaping the blame on typhoons that directly hit the country is a "misconception." The study's researchers pored over weather data from 1961 to 2022, focusing on rainfall patterns along the country's western coast from July to September. They found that storms hundreds of kilometers away could be inducing the southwest monsoon or habagat into unleashing more rain than an actual typhoon.

An average of 33.1 percent of the monsoon rains comes from tropical cyclones that do not make landfall but enhance the habagat, which sucks in large amounts of moisture from the surrounding seas, the study noted.

The location where a tropical cyclone forms, or its "genesis point," also affects the amount of rainfall. Those that form farther away from the Philippines tend to move north-east of Luzon and are more likely to enhance the monsoon.

By contrast, "those that form closer to the country often take shorter, westward tracks and thus have a weaker effect on the southwest monsoon," it said. In July last year, Super Typhoon Carina was too far out in the Pacific Ocean to threaten the Philippines, yet it induced the habagat to unleash nearly a full month's worth of rain on Quezon City in



just 24 hours, the study said.

Even storms that did not reach typhoon strength triggered unusually heavy rain. Crising was one of them, but in tandem with a hyper-active habagat, it affected 370,000 people and forced 22,000 to flee their homes.

The study is significant, especially when placed alongside 2019 research by the US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) indicating that the warming of the Indo-Pacific Ocean is altering rainfall patterns in the regions around it.

Warmer seas spawn more storms that are more destructive.

"Climate model simulations indicate that continued warming of the Indo-Pacific Ocean is highly likely, which may further intensify these changes in global rainfall patterns," said one weather expert. "This means that we need to enhance our ocean observational arrays to monitor these changes accurately and update our climate models to skillfully predict the challenges presented by a warming world." Earlier studies linked emerging weather patterns to increased regional weather extremes like heat waves and high rainfall in Indonesia, Singapore, South India, the Philippines and the Western Pacific.

"These findings are significant in the context of climate change as they reveal that new and emerging weather patterns are contributing to increasingly severe weather in a region home to over a billion people, as well as unique and vulnerable ecosystems," another climate scientist pointed out. "With extreme weather events posing severe socio-economic and environmental challenges, understanding these changes is critical for improving climate models and informing future climate adaptation strategies." The Economic and Social Commission for Asia and South Pacific (Escap) shares the same concern. "Flooding and drought events are set to intensify, water scarcity is expected to be further exacerbated, and heat waves are poised to become a major emerging risk in Asia and the Pacific," Escap noted. The World Meteorological Organization (WMO) stresses the need for accurate weather forecasting to enable "farmers to protect crops, utilities to balance energy supply and demand, businesses to manage logistics, governments to prepare for disasters, and communities to safeguard lives and livelihoods." A better understanding of changing weather patterns allows local governments and disaster agencies to fine-tune their response.

try," added the TESDA chief.

The STAR Awards Program recognizes training programs that have exceeded the minimum registration requirements set by TESDA. The STAR Program has 4 categories, with the lowest "Candidate Status" given to training programs with identified weaknesses, and the highest "Three Stars" awarded to those that present standards substantially above the threshold of competency-based training programs. This year, 54 training programs being offered by 34 public and private tech-voc institutions were conferred with the STAR Award.

Receiving the higher, Two Stars level of the awards for their training programs are Jacobo Z. Gonzales Memorial School of Arts and Trades (for Electronic Products Assembly and Servicing (EPAS) NC II); Regional Training Center – CALABARZON (for Organic Agriculture Production NC II and Shielded Metal Arc Welding (SMAW) NC I); and, Provincial Training Center – Bilar (for Cookery NC II).

One Star awardees include TESDA - NAVOTAAS Training Institute (Refrigeration and Air - Conditioning Servicing (DomRAC) NC II); Regional Training Center - National Capital Region (Mechatronics Servicing NC II and PV Systems Installation NC II); IGAMA Colleges Foundation, Inc. (Health Care Services NC II); Pangasinan Technological Institute (Bread

NC II and SMAW NC II).

Also receiving One Star recognition are Provincial Training Center – Palawan (Driving NC II); Simeon Suan Vocational and Technical College (Dressmaking NC II and

Organic Agriculture Production NC II); Camarines Sur Institute of Fisheries and Marine Sciences (Organic Agriculture Production NC II); Dumalag Vocational Technical School (Housekeeping NC II, FBS NC II, and Dressmaking NC II); Leon Ganzon Polytechnic College (Organic Agriculture Production NC II and Cookery NC II); Provincial Training Center – Samboan (EIM NC II); Provincial Training Center – Daanbantayan (Housekeeping NC II); Regional Training Center VII Cebu (Automotive Servicing NC I); Regional Training Center - VIII Tacloban (Automotive Servicing NC IV); Balicuatro College of Arts and Trades (SMAW NC II); Dipolog School of Fisheries (Bartending NC II and Bread and Pastry Production NC II); Oroquieta Agro-Industrial School (Organic Agriculture Production NC II); Davao Oriental Polytechnic Institute (Animal Production (Poultry-Chicken) NC II, Bread and Pastry Production NC II, and Cookery NC II); General Santos National School of Arts and Trades (FBS NC II); and Surigao del Norte College of Agriculture and Technology (Cookery NC II and SMAW NC II).

TESDA's STAR Program reviews how well training programs are being implemented and checks if they meet international quality benchmarks like the EAS TVET Quality Assurance Framework and the Asia Pacific Accreditation and Certification Commission. Incentives such as exemption from compliance audit, and scholarship allocation grants are given to STAR Awardees.
