

ASEZ Launches "Zero Plastic 2040" Campaign in Dasmariñas City, Philippines University Student Volunteers from the Church of God Clean Up Streets to Raise Awareness of Plastic Pollution

Dasmariñas, Cavite, in the CALABARZON region, was transformed into a cleaner, plastic-free environment, thanks to the "Zero Plastic 2040" campaign launched on the 10th of August 2025 by ASEZ, a university student volunteer group from the World Mission Society Church of God (General Pastor Joo-Cheol Kim). In response to the growing global concern over plastic pollution, ASEZ is conducting a variety of initiatives—including campaigns, education, resource recycling, and local cleanups—with the goal of ending plastic pollution by 2040.



The cleanup activity began at 8:00am and continued for 2 hours. Approximately 170 people, including ASEZ members, barangay officials, sangguniang kabataan leaders, students from Kolehiyo ng Lungsod ng Dasmariñas and National College of Science and Technology, members of KDBM (Kababaihan ng Dasmariñas sa Bagong Milenyo), representatives of Dasmariñas CENRO, and the Dasmariñas City police station, joined the cleanup effort which was held along the streets of Malihan and Bautista within the vicinity of Barangay Zone IV. Councilor Fernando Laudato, Barangay Chairman Alexander Geneveo, Ms. Lady Denize Torno of Dasmariñas CENRO, and

PCPT Polly Padios opened the event with encouraging speeches to motivate the volunteers. Councilor Restituto Encabo and Councilor Glenn Wynne Malihan also graced the event with their presence.

The volunteers meticulously picked up single-use plastic straws, cups, food wrappers, and plastic bags along a 2km stretch from Malihan Street to Bautista Street. The area, densely populated with students and workers, has developed into a commercial zone in urgent need of cleanup. That day, approximately 297.83 kg of trash was collected in 75 recycled sacks, and among the collected trash, 156.23 kg are plastic wastes. The Community Environment and

Natural Resources Office (CENRO) of Dasmariñas City Hall supported the campaign by providing a garbage truck for proper waste disposal. Recyclable plastics were sorted and disposed according to the standards.

According to the 2023 UNEP report "Turning off the Tap," the next 3 to 5 years are critical for transitioning to systems that can end plastic pollution by 2040. The report warns that delaying action could result in 80 million more metric tons of plastic entering the environment. An ASEZ representative stated, "As members of the future generation, university students take the lead in this activity to help create a future free from plastic pollution. More attention and par-

ticipation are needed to build a sustainable planet." The cleanup activity also raised awareness among students and citizens about the importance of environmental protection and the need for action.

Barangay Zone IV Chairman Alexander Geneveo, expressed his gratitude, saying, "I believe that your group has a vision to engrave a positive effect for Mother Earth, and at the same time to help our youth in creating a clean environment for the future."

SPM Fernando Laudato, also acknowledged the volunteers, saying, "Sana ay patuloy ninyong gawin ang mga ganitong programa at

ASEZ, whose name stands for "Save the Earth from A to Z," is an international university student volunteer group under the Church of God. With the belief that "university students can change the world," they carry out activities such as climate action, disaster relief, crime prevention, and local community service across the globe. Supported by the Church of God established in over 7,800 regions across 175 countries, ASEZ has received about 500 awards, including The UNCCD Executive

In the Philippines, ASEZ regularly carries out environmental initiatives in Calabarzon region (Santa Rosa River, Cavite State University, Malabanan watershed), Metro Manila, Davao, Central Luzon, and Northern Mindanao, including street, park, beach, riverside cleanups, and tree planting. These efforts play an essential role in environmental improvement and climate action. ASEZ also visits orphanages and special education centers to offer encouragement and emotional support to children and youth.

Their efforts have been recognized with citations, letters of appreciation,

Editorial

A test of Myanmar junta's sincerity

THE military government of Myanmar has announced it was ending the state of emergency that justified its takeover from civilian rule in 2021. It also scheduled new elections by the end of this year.

While these pronouncements bring a fresh wave of optimism, lingering doubts about the junta's motives cannot be glossed over. The cabal led by Gen. Min Aung Hlaing has a record of duplicity that has frustrated efforts to restore democratic rule and end the civil strife that continues to ravage the country.

Following its putsch, the junta shut down the democratic process, imposing an oppressive regime that has brutally cracked down on dissent.

Close to 3,000 civilians have been killed and 17,572 arrested as the dark clouds of civil war spread across Myanmar. The United Nations estimated that more than a million people have been displaced as military forces clashed with pro-democracy and ethnic groups.

International condemnation failed to pressure Hlaing into relaxing his iron-fisted rule. Economic sanctions clamped down by the United States and other Western countries didn't work, either.

Observers believe that the sanctions would be ineffective because China continues to prop up Myanmar, where Beijing has substantial investments.

Hlaing also continued to thumb his nose at the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (Asean), which couldn't get its members to agree on sterner measures against the region's "bad boy."

Proposals to cut off the inflow of goods and services through an Asean-imposed trade embargo, never got off the ground.

The best the bloc could come up with was to exclude Hlaing from its summit 2021, and strip Myanmar of its chairmanship of Asean in 2026.

The general merely shrugged off the snub. And in a show of disdain, the junta clapped back, saying the snub ignores "the Asean's good traditions of fostering unity in diversity and resolving differences through consultations and consensus would greatly affect the unity and centrality of the Asean."

In 2023, the junta reduced the prison sentence of democracy icon Aung San Suu Kyi by six years after pardoning her in five out of her 19 convictions. More than 7,000 prisoners were also pardoned.

Yet, only a day earlier, the military government declared that the state of emergency it imposed two and a half years ago will be extended for another six months.



The show of false magnanimity says a lot about the junta's credibility, or the utter lack of it.

In the last two years, however, the situation in Myanmar has started to shift. Anti-government forces have wrested control of key areas, particularly those near the border with China. Myanmarese fleeing the fighting have been streaming across the border in increasing numbers.

China, who doesn't want to be burdened with a refugee crisis, has come down hard on Hlaing to negotiate a truce with the rebel groups.

Last March, a powerful earthquake devastated Myanmar, killing up to 3,500 people and leaving structural damage worth \$11 billion. That's 14 percent of the country's GDP.

Chinese pressure, the heavy economic blow from the earthquake and the battlefield victories by rebel groups may have forced Hlaing to rethink his political options.

One sign that Myanmar's leaders are open to change is the decision to clamp down on human trafficking syndicates and online scam farms that are believed to enjoy covert government backing.

Emergency rule handed over legislative, judicial and executive powers to Hlaing as head of the State Administration Council, the junta's official designation.

That setup will be restructured. The council will be dissolved, and Hlaing steps down as president and prime minister. He becomes acting president until the elections are held six months after the emergency rule is lifted.

If the junta's change of heart is genuine, it must now allow the implementation of the long-dormant five-point Asean Consensus to end the Myanmar crisis.

The plan calls for a ceasefire, a dialogue, the designation of an Asean mediator, providing humanitarian aid, and sending a delegation to Myanmar to meet with all parties involved in the conflict.

The junta must also guarantee that the impending elections are fair and transparent by allowing international observers to monitor the process.

DOST-CAR hosts back-to-back events in Baguio City to champion resilience and innovation in Luzon



Baguio City - The Department of Science and Technology – Cordillera Administrative Region (DOST-CAR) have successfully hosted two major science-led events, the HANDA Pilipinas Luzon Leg 2025 and the 2025 Regional Science, Technology, and Innovation Week (RSTW) from August 7 to 9 at the Newtown Plaza Hotel, Baguio City.

The twin events gathered leaders from the national government agencies and local government units, researchers, innovators, educators, and disaster risk reduction practitioners during the three-day celebration which highlighted how science, technology, and innovation (STI) can empower and transform communities.

With the theme "Bida ang HANDA: STI for a Smart and Resilient Luzon," the HANDA Pilipinas Luzon Leg 2025 underscored the growing importance of proactive and science-based approaches to disaster preparedness.

As the host region, DOST-CAR spearheaded the convergence of key stakeholders to demonstrate how STI can equip communities not only to respond but to anticipate, mitigate, adapt to, and even thrive amid challenges posed by climate change and natural disasters.

Baguio City Vice Mayor

Faustino Olowan, speaking on behalf of Mayor Benjamin Magalang, formally welcomed the participants and extended the city's gratitude to DOST-CAR for choosing Baguio as the host city. He emphasized the event's relevance to local resilience efforts and expressed his support with the words, "Mabuhay ang siyensa at inobasyon para sa Bagong Pilipinas."

DOST-CAR Regional Director Dr. Nancy A. Bantog focused on the role of collaboration in achieving shared resilience goals, noting that the event brings together national agencies, scientists, innovators, disaster risk reduction experts, local planners, and the academe. In her message, she framed the event as a platform for exchanging tools, ideas, and solutions that strengthen regional and local capacities for disaster preparedness and smart development.

Keynote speaker and DOST Secretary Dr.

Renato U. Solidum Jr. echoed the event's central message as he emphasized the vital role of STI in equipping communities with the capacity to prevent, reduce, and respond to disaster risks. He highlighted DOST-led programs such as GeoRiskPH, Project SARAI, DANAS Project, MOCCOV, GRIND, and Innovation Hubs as vital components of the country's broader resilience agenda.

"Let us take action. Let us be prepared. Let us be HANDA," he said, rallying participants to champion science as a tool for survival and progress.

Presidential Assistant for Northern Luzon Assistant Secretary Ana Carmela V. Remigio also graced the occasion and expressed her support for DOST's continuing initiatives. She recognized that these efforts align with President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr.'s administration and with the strategic priorities outlined in the Philippine Develop-



ment Plan.

In the afternoon of the same day, the 2025 Regional Science, Technology, and Innovation Week (RSTW) in CAR was formally launched, also under the leadership of DOST-CAR. The regional celebration carried the theme "Building Smart and Sustainable Communities" and focused on the application of STI in improving local livelihoods, education, public services, and environmental management.

Dr. Bantog once again emphasized the importance of making science accessible, responsive, and empowering for all Filipinos, particularly those in geographically isolated and disadvantaged areas.

Among the highlights of the RSTW opening was the launch of DOST-

CAR's official mascot, "CURIOSTI," which symbolizes curiosity and the enthusiasm to explore science among learners and the general public. The mascot is expected to be a visual icon of DOST-CAR's continuing commitment to promote science culture in the region.

Secretary Solidum returned to spotlight DOST's four core pillars: human well-being, wealth creation, wealth protection, and sustainability, and reaffirmed the agency's role in building stronger, innovation-driven local economies.

As part of DOST's support for the Cordilleras, a ceremonial turnover of mountain engineering technologies was also conducted. These included slope stability

analysis and engineering interventions for rice terraces and roads in terrain areas, as well as an artificial groundwater recharge facility designed to help mitigate droughts and flooding in vulnerable upland communities.

Throughout the three-day celebration, participants are expected to engage in various forums, technical sessions, and exhibits showcasing ready-for-adoptions technologies from DOST agencies, partner SUCs, LGUs, and private sector collaborators. PMCJ on ADB Energy Policy Review 2025: A true energy transition requires fossil fuel phaseout; facilitates genuine consultation processes; stops false solutions

Quezon City, Philippines — Still reeling from the series of monsoon-intensified storms and typhoons that marched across the country, the Philippines appears to experience yet another blow to its climate future. The Asian Development Bank's (ADB) 2025 Energy Policy Review features a rushed timeline, a lack of transparency in the review process, and the focus on regressive climate policy in energy investment that will cause rippling damage to the already climate-crisis-burdened communities in the country.

"The urgency of our repeated calls for the ADB to do better is not being heard," Elle Bartolome, Senior Executive Officer for Policy and Communications of the Philippine Movement for Climate Justice (PMCJ), said.

She notes that the Energy Policy Review this year appears rushed, with only a short amount of time for CSOs to talk with the bank on its policies, especially after its actions, or lack thereof, have been prolonging the unwanted existence of the coal industry in the country. The ADB also appears to be supporting other forms of fossil fuel power generation, all of this while claiming to be a champion for the climate and sustainability.

"Besides its continued support of coal under the guise of 'early' retirement, the ADB has expanded its Energy Transition Mechanism (ETM) to include fossil fuels like oil and gas, the latter of which is being wrongfully framed as a transition

fuel," Bartolome said.

The communities surrounding coal plants in Misamis Oriental, Lanao Del Norte, Sarangani, Calaca in Batangas, Quezon Province, Bataan, Zambales, and Cebu have suffered as a result of the ADB's funding of numerous coal projects and expansions in the Philippines. According to its ETM, which lacks accountability-seeking from coal polluters, there are serious gaps and misdirections in its policies, despite its claims to support a clean energy transition and expedite the phaseout of coal. PMCJ explained that this benefits them while causing populations that are the subject of their programs to endure protracted agony.

PMCJ National Coordinator Ian Rivera said that fossil fuels, whether coal, gas, or oil, are among the most significant contributors to global warming and the climate crisis. He explained, "Oil accounts for a third of the world's total carbon

emissions, and natural gas accounts for 20 percent of the total emissions. In total, fossil fuels drive nearly 90 percent of carbon dioxide emissions in the world. To fund the creation or even expansion of these energy sources is to fund the death of entire families, communities, animal species, and the planet itself."

Rivera stressed that International Financial Institutions (IFIs) like the ADB are funding the destruction of the climate and the planet each time they back yet another coal plant expansion, approve a fossil fuel plant, and delay the true energy transition to clean sources of energy.

Aside from greenwashing and its continued support for fossil fuels, ADB's decarbonization plans also include a seeming removal of the prohibition on nuclear energy investments, the extractive mining of critical minerals, and support for false energy solutions like am-

monia, hydrogen, biofuels co-firing, and carbon capture technology.

"This is a distraction from the ADB's wanton push for planet-killing energy sources. These false solutions require a significant investment of time and resources, which only seems beneficial to them because it prolongs the worldwide dependence on fossil fuels and the large profits that come along with it. They willingly choose this path despite knowing that these solutions ultimately leave the world worse off," Bartolome stressed.

"They would sooner waste resources on technologies that ultimately don't contribute to alleviating the rising global temperatures than to actually support proven and working solutions that do not endanger people's lives and plunge them and their communities into poverty. We could have a people-centered energy system that does not rely on dirty sources and is much cheaper than

these fuels that pose existential threats," Rivera ended. **#StopFundingThe** **#ClimateJusticeNow**


