PGC brings essential healthcare service to Maragondon community

The Provincial Government of Cavite (PGC) brought essential healthcare services closer to residents of Brgy. Poblacion I-A, Maragondon through a Medical and Dental Mission held on June 29, benefiting a total of 389 residents.



The outreach activity was carried out by the healthcare professionals from the General Emilio Aguinaldo Memorial Hospital (GEAMH), personnel from the Office of the Provincial Governor (OPG), the Rural Health Unit of Maragondon, and dedicated Barangay Health Workers (BHWs). The mission provided 316 medical consultations, 51 dental services, 5 electrocardiogram (ECG) procedures, and 17 fasting blood sugar (FBS) tests.

PORTASOL Technology Ensures Cleaner, Faster Drying for Matungao Cacao Farmers

Traditional open-sun drying leaves hardworking farmers at the mercy of unpredictable weather, leading to high post-harvest losses and lower market prices. To address this challenge, the Local Government Unit of Matungao and DOST Lanao del Norte officially sealed their partnership on June 18 at Matungao Municipal Hall. Led by Mayor Hon. Jaber M. Azis, this collaboration focuses on introducing science-based solutions to secure local food production and protect farmers' livelihoods.



To guide the community toward sustainable agriculture, DOST is deploying the Portable Solar Dryer (PORTASOL). This innovative technology directly answers the need for a faster, cleaner drying process. Featuring stackable, enclosed alu-

minum trays, it protects crops from rain, dust, and pests. Following the signing, DOST conducted a hands-on orientation for the Matungao Integrated Farmers Association to ensure they maximize this tool for their cacao production.

Officer Mr. Steward D. Rosiana emphasized that adopting these smart tools reduces hard labor while preserving crop quality. By working closely with local leaders, DOST helps transform traditional farming challenges into

DOST-CALABARZON records improved evacuation time during Second Quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill

The Department of Science and Technology–CALABARZON (DOST-CALABARZON) actively participated in the 2026 Second Quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill (NSED) on June 18, 2026, reinforcing the agency's commitment to disaster preparedness and workplace safety.

Employees from the DOST-CALABARZON simultaneously carried out the "Duck, Cover, and Hold" procedure before proceeding to designated evacuation areas

following the alarm, in accordance with established earthquake safety protocols.

The Regional Office completed the evacuation in 1 minute and 29

seconds, improving its performance from the 1 minute and 44 seconds recorded during the First Quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill.



The improved evacuation time reflects the continued familiarity of personnel with emergency procedures and the agency's sustained efforts to strengthen earthquake preparedness.

The activity served as an opportunity to assess the preparedness of personnel and evaluate the effectiveness of existing emergency response procedures. Through the regular conduct of earthquake drills, DOST-

DSWD expands supplementary feeding program, strengthens child nutrition in communities

CALAMBA CITY, Laguna — The Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD) has expanded the implementation of its Supplementary Feeding Program (SFP) for 2026, increasing the feeding cycle from 120 to 180 days and allocating a budget of P8.5 billion to P9.6 billion to benefit more than 1.8 million children enrolled in local government unit (LGU)-run Child Development Centers (CDCs) and Supervised Neighborhood Play (SNP) nationwide.

The enhanced program, also known as Batang Nutri-Care, aims to combat malnutrition, stunting, and involuntary hunger among children aged three to five through the daily provision of nutritious hot meals. Areas with high incidences of undernutrition will also receive milk or fresh milk-based products, while children in SNPs will benefit from indigenous or locally produced nutritious food.

In CALABARZON, the expanded program is now being rolled out in partnership with local government units, reflecting a shared commitment to improving the health and nutrition of young learners. More than 116,000 children in the region are expected to benefit from the initiative, which also promotes stronger collaboration among parents, caregivers, and local communities in ensuring children's well-being.

Among the LGUs that have begun implementing the enhanced feeding program is the Municipality of Pangil, Laguna, which recently received a P2.583-million check from DSWD Field Office IV-A for the implementation of the SFP in 11 CDCs. Mayor Gerard Aritao expressed gratitude to DSWD, noting that the assistance will help sustain nutritious meals for daycare learners and support

their healthy growth and development.

"Ang pondong ito ay magsisilbing mahalagang suporta upang mapanatili ang wastong nutrisyon at kalusugan ng ating mga mag-aaral. Patuloy ang pakikipagtulungan ng lokal na pamahalaan sa iba't ibang ahensya upang maisulong ang kapakanan at kinabukasan ng bawat batang Pangileño," Mayor Aritao said.

In Lucban, Quezon, the local government officially launched the SFP for 28 CDCs, reaffirming its commitment to safeguarding the health and nutrition of children. The program, implemented through the Municipal Social Welfare and Development Office (MSWDO) in partnership with DSWD Region IV-A, also encourages parents and caregivers to actively participate in promoting proper nutrition at home.

SFP will provide nutritious meals to 1,380 daycare learners enrolled in 40 CDCs, underscoring the importance of sustained partnerships between DSWD and LGUs in addressing child malnutrition.

According to DSWD Protective Services Bureau Director Alfrey Gulla, the increased budget and longer feeding period are expected to improve the nutritional outcomes of participating children. In 2025, about 74.63 percent of under-

nourished children served by the program showed improved nutritional status after receiving fortified meals and nutrition interventions. The agency aims to exceed this achievement through the expanded implementation this year.

Beyond food provision, the SFP integrates nutrition and health education through the Parent Effectiveness Service, equipping parents and caregivers with practical knowledge on preparing nutritious meals and maintaining healthy lifestyles at home. This community-based approach recognizes that improving child nutrition requires both government intervention and active family participation.

Anchored on the national government's campaign to reduce malnutrition and stunting, the expanded SFP highlights the continuing partnership among DSWD, local government units, and communities in investing in children's health during their formative years. By ensuring access to nutritious food and strengthening nutrition education, the program helps lay the foundation for healthier, more active, and productive future generations. **(CCM-PIA CALABARZON / with reports from DSWD)**

The role of women in AI development must be fully recognized

UN Women, the United Nations entity dedicated to gender equality and empowering women and girls, has warned that artificial intelligence (AI) is adopting old gender stereotypes, which amplify online abuse and leave women out of the decision-making process in mapping the digital future.

UN Women issued the warning ahead of the UN Global Dialogue on Artificial Intelligence Governance and the AI for Good Global Summit in Geneva next month.

Gender-biased AI is not a new concern. There were already signs that early generative AI models were using data that were historically skewed against women.

In 2018, Amazon's beta AI recruitment engine was found to prefer male applicants, because its algorithm was based on a decade's worth of resumes submitted by men. The giant technology company was forced to shut down the engine.

A "Gender Shades Study" released the same year exposed glitches in facial recognition software that was biased against darker-skinned women. It turned out that the software's image datasets were based mainly on male- and white-dominated faces.

Gender inequality was also evident in choosing a female voice as a personal digital assistant, according to a 2019 Unesco study. Apple's Siri, Amazon's Alexa and Microsoft's Cortana reinforce the social reality in which majority of personal assistants or secretaries are women, Unesco said.

Gender bias against women continues to spread into the realm of information technology. AI and automation "are throwing newer challenges to achieving substantive gender equality in the era of the Fourth Industrial Revolution," Surya Deva, a member of the UN Working Group on Business and Human Rights, wrote in a 2020 article in Open Global Rights.

"If AI and automation are not developed and applied in a gender-responsive way, they are likely to reproduce and reinforce existing gender stereotypes and discriminatory



social norms," Deva said.

Existing guardrails for AI lack a strong gender perspective. Equality is almost an afterthought, with no clear strategies on how it can be achieved.

A study by UN Women of 133 AI systems found that 44 percent had gender bias. Large language models continue to associate women with the home, family and childcare, while men are slotted into roles that are linked to business, leadership and career success.

What worries Jayathma Wickramanayake, UN Women Lead on Digital Technologies, most is that the bias is not a design flaw, but a "real policy gap that was left wide open."

The risks for women and girls go beyond stereotyping. "Women already face disproportionate levels of abuse online, and AI is making some forms of violence easier to create and spread," UN Women said.

Last year, it warned about the "manosphere," a growing online community of young men and boys "looking to influencers for guidance on issues like dating, fitness and fatherhood."

Groups within this community promote misogynist ideas, portraying women as manipulative or dangerous.

Women are also a minority in tech-driven sectors, making up only 30 percent of the global AI workforce. And because they practically have no say in AI development, their perspectives on

the technology's future go unnoticed.

Addressing gender bias is not only a matter of rights, it also makes commercial sense, UN Women said.

Advertising unencumbered by stereotypes delivers better results. Brands using inclusive advertising "recorded higher sales growth, greater customer loyalty and strong pricing power than competitors."

Embedding gender equality into AI technology can only be achieved if governments, tech companies and international rights organizations come up with a new blueprint that can "detect stereotypes rather than reproduce them, broaden representation instead of narrowing it, and improve accessibility at scale for those current systems often overlooked."

The UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights offers a framework built around gender-responsive assessment, gender-transformative measures and gender-transformative remedies.

Women must be fully involved in all steps relating to AI design, development and application. And AI companies must engage gender experts and women's groups in conducting human rights due diligence.

The data on which algorithms are based must be disaggregated, or separated by gender.

The bottom line: Women must be embraced as a full partner in AI development.

als that address priority needs and contribute to inclusive development.

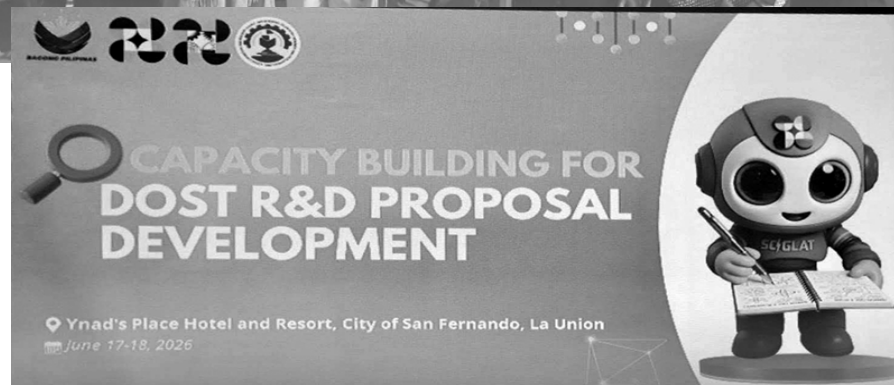

Xyrelle G. Villacote, Project Technical Assistant IV (PTA IV); Mr. Lan Carlo L. Balabag, PTA IV; and Mr. Abner Dorado, PAA V.
